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The Autism Society was the first call I made after my son, Tyler, was diagnosed with autism 14 years ago. Since then, I've had the honor of working with the Autism Society Southern Arizona to provide needed programs, education, support and information to those impacted by autism in my community. The past two years, my passion has been working with Affiliate leaders across our network to ensure Affiliates have what they need to provide the most efficient and effective services to improve the quality of life for all individuals with autism. I am proud of the Autism Society's incredible impact, as we work towards a more inclusive, supportive society.

LETTER FROM OUR LEADERS

Since its founding in 1965, the Autism Society of America has been our nation's leading autism grassroots organization. Today, the Autism Society of America's national network of caring and compassionate team members continues to help more individuals with autism advance their quality of life than any other grassroots autism organization.

The Autism Society and our 79 affiliates work hard to provide advocacy, education, information and referral, support, and community at national, state and local levels. Collectively, we were honored to serve and support over 620,000 people in 2018. Highlights from this number include over 225,000 phone calls, emails, and support cases, 157,000 attendees at Autism Society events, plus over 40,000 individuals raised their voices at Support Groups across the country.

1 in 59 children

are diagnosed with autism. This is up from 1 in 88, five years ago, and 1 in 125, just ten years ago.

500,000 individuals

with autism spectrum disorder are transitioning to adulthood in the United States.

88,000 individuals

are on state waiting lists, hoping to receive adult housing services; the rate continues to grow exponentially.

85% of autistic adults

with a college education are unemployed.

We believe that together we can accomplish a better quality of life, create more opportunities in employment where skills are valued and appreciated, build a more inclusive society, and advocate for better legislative rights at the national and state level.

In addition to our daily commitments, the Autism Society of America is dedicated to being a responsive, accountable, and transparent organization to our donors and the community we serve.

Responsiveness means that we are available and accessible to be the support the community needs. Our support spans everyday life, natural disasters and traumatic events - such as the fires that impacted our California affiliates, and a mass shooting impacting autistic individuals in Virginia - while making certain that we remain a nonpartisan, reasonable voice of advice and education.

For us, transparency means providing financial information and measurable outcomes for our donors' generous contributions. We hold ourselves accountable to our mission and a high standard of ethics when fulfilling our work. Accountability means that we are demonstrating the most effective use of our dollars, spent in ways that produce maximum positive results at the lowest possible cost. It also means that while the numbers we serve are great, it is as important to demonstrate that we are in fact helping individuals and families advance their quality of life.

We are immensely proud of the work done each and every day by the Autism Society and our network of caring, passionate and dedicated affiliates. Thank you to the thousands of compassionate volunteers, the affiliate staff members who work tirelessly to hold the hand of a person in need, to our national and affiliate board members dedicating their time and expertise, and to our hardworking staff that has ensured the Autism Society of America remains the go-to agency for all impacted by autism. Collectively, the results produced are extremely impressive, and we thank all the individuals, families, corporations, foundations and so many more that have assisted us in fulfilling our mission.

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AUTISM SOCIETY IMPACT REPORT

The Autism Society of America works tirelessly to measurably improve the quality of life for individuals and families affected by autism. Our network of 79 affiliates operates in 37 states and collectively we support our community through information & referral services, direct support, education & awareness, and policy advocacy at the local, state and national level.

Education, Support and Community Building

Honored to serve & support

approx. 620,000 individuals and families affected by autism.

Network hosted

approximately 8,000 events to support our community; this includes fundraisers, conferences, walks, inclusion events, and more.

Approx. 157,000

people attended community events hosted by the Autism Society network.

Policy Advocacy

2,000+ individuals

sent letters to representatives through the Autism Society Action Center.

Advocated for

the passage of the Lifespan Respite Care Reauthorization Act, the extension of Money Follows the Person Program, and maintained funding for programs important to people with autism.

Supported 10 bills

that directly impacted the autism community; we advocated in 150+ meetings with legislators, and committed over 3,000 National staff hours committed to public policy.

Measurably Improved Quality of Life

8/10 individuals

who reached out to the National Help Line would contact again, and recommend the Autism Society to others.

48% of our audience

indicated that having Support Networks for autistic adults was a critical need; the Autism Society network hosted 624 "Adults on the Spectrum" Support Groups across the country.

8/10 individuals

who contact our National Help Line expect to improve their quality of life.


TOTAL INDIVIDUALS SERVED, YEAR OVER YEAR

The Affiliate Management team at National provided 5,200 support hours to affiliates; plus another 2,400 hours of support from additional staff members.





ADVOCATING FOR CHANGE

Every day the Autism Society advocates for change at the national, state, and local level to improve the quality of life in all areas for individuals and families living with autism. With our strong Public Policy Committee, staff and Board of Directors, we educate policymakers so that they utilize science-based evidence to develop effective laws and protective programs across healthcare, employment, housing, education, and long-term services and supports. Our goal is to ensure that individuals with autism have supports in place to achieve their full potential and live high quality lives. We are proud to work with individuals on the autism spectrum across our governance board and staff, as we work together to improve the lives of our community.

The Autism Society of America advocates for multiple federal public policies that improve the lives of children and adults with autism. These policies include early intervention, K-12 education, post-secondary education, transition services, employment, healthcare, and long-term home and community-based services and supports.

In 2018, we successfully worked on the following public policy activities:

Took a leadership role in advocating for the reauthorization and improvement of the Autism Collaboration, Accountability, Research, Education, and Supports (CARES) Act, the Lifespan Respite Care Act, and an extension of Money Follows the Person Program. These laws are on the verge of becoming law.

Supported the Coalition to Advance Competitive Integrated Employment through Hill briefings and the introduction of several bills.

Maintained federal funding for programs important to people with autism, such as special education and employment services, and newly authorized money to protect children who wander.

Continued to advocate to protect Medicaid funded long-term care and protections within the Affordable Care Act.

Submitted comments on numerous proposed regulatory changes related to health care, education, employment, and civil rights.

Supported affiliates to advocate at the state and local levels in the areas of restraints and seclusion in schools, school safety, and first responder training.

Approximately 200 people with autism, their families, and affiliate leaders visited their Members of Congress to educate about the needs of people with autism.

Through our online, interactive Action Center, our advocates sent approximately 2,000 letters to their legislators. With the help of our advocates, we have expanded the membership of the Autism Bipartisan and Bicameral Caucus, led reauthorization efforts for the Autism CARES Act and the Lifespan Respite Care Act and submitted comments on proposed regulations.






